Pittsburgh (PA) - The City of Pittsburgh Commission on Human Relations (PghCHR) in collaboration with the Human Rights City Alliance, and the Gender Equity Commission will be holding a press conference to commemorate ***International Human Rights Day***, the 70th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights (UDHR). Mayor Peduto and members of City Council will sign a proclamation re-committing themselves to making human rights a priority in policy and planning. The press conference will take place on **Monday, December 10, 2018 at 11:00am on the 5th floor of the City-County Building, 414 Grant Street.**

In the wake of the recent hate crime that took the lives of congregants at the Tree of Life Synagogue, Pittsburgh residents join people from all over the world to draw attention to growing threats to the freedoms and liberties that many take for granted.

In 2018, global displacement is at a record high, and both international migration and internal displacement are fueling xenophobia, anti-Semitism, and racism, which in turn undermine social solidarity and democracy. It is therefore extremely urgent that we mark this International Human Rights Day by reaffirming the values and principles of human rights. The UDHR provides a blueprint for building strong, resilient, and cohesive societies capable of addressing the critical challenges of our day.

Forced displacement locally and globally undermines community resiliency and solidarity. Pittsburgh's immigrant and refugee communities face constant threats of deportation and harassment due to their status as people displaced from their homelands. And our city's efforts to renew itself along traditional, market lines is exacerbating the long-standing affordable housing crisis, fueling the displacement of many residents each day. More than 20,000 African American residents have been displaced from Pittsburgh in recent decades due to rising housing costs, and we continue to lose an estimated three African American neighbors each day.

We gather to lift up the Universal Declaration of Human Rights as a guide to community action and public policy. In that spirit, we demand that our public officials take seriously their commitments to ending all forms of discrimination, advancing gender equity, and to making Pittsburgh a true "human rights city." We have invited spokespeople from diverse constituencies in our city to give voice to the persistent gaps between our ideals and the realities experienced by too many people in our city. Human rights must be the foundation for governments, and we stand with our brothers and sisters worldwide to reaffirm our commitment to these values as we promise to work together to promote human rights learning in our communities and to make our city a place that reflects and defends them. Human rights begin at home, right here in this Human Rights City of Pittsburgh!
